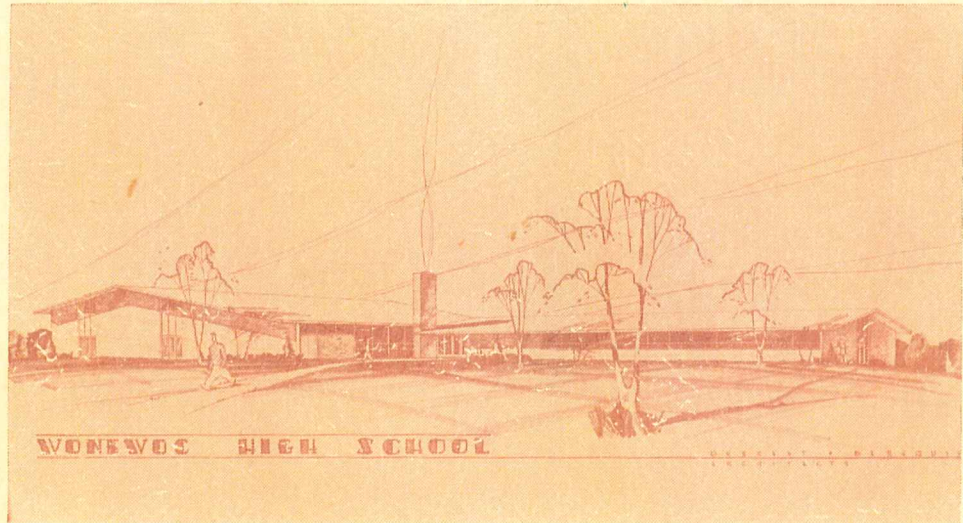

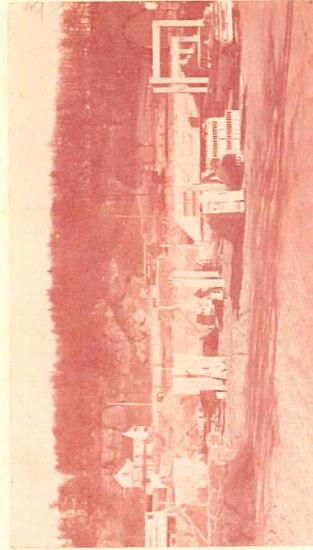


Ground Breaking October 23, 1959

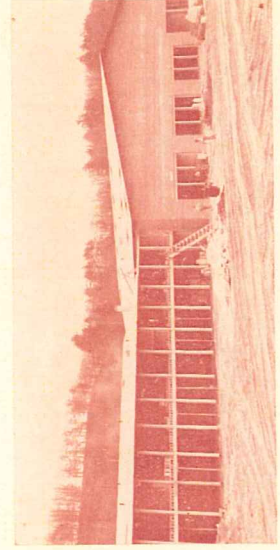
The County Superintendent "Breaks Ground" . . . and school officials urged him to take larger shovels!

Dirt removed for footings and basement was used to increase the size of useable site

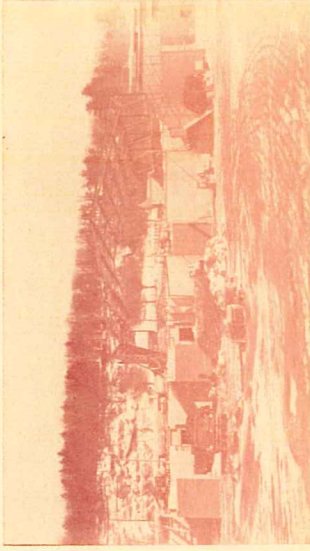
Much of the masonry was done during the coldest part of the winter

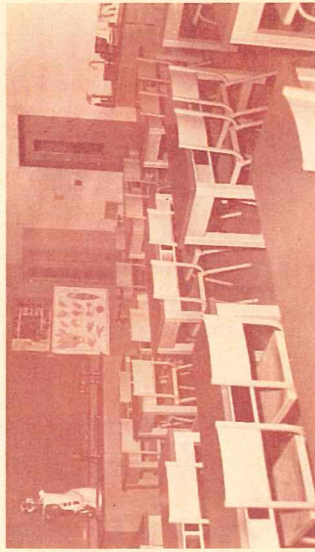

### REMARKS:

1. Square ft. cost and cubic ft. cost are calculated only on the total General, Heating and Ventilating, Plumbing and Electrical Work Contracts.
2. To obtain true cost data, the estimated market value of the steel furnished by the Owner is included in the square ft. and cubic ft. costs.



All of the furniture and most of the equipment used in the science rooms was purchased under the Nat'l Def. Ed. Act, wherein the District received a refund of \$8,355 from the Federal Gov't for spending \$16,000



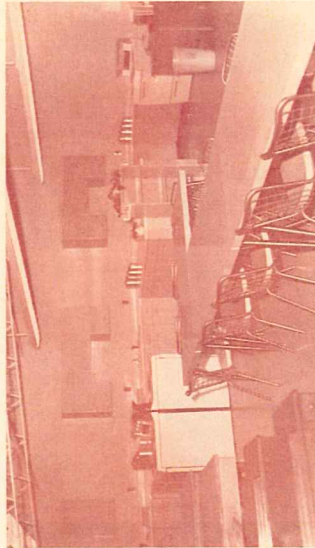
**Biology and General Science Classroom**



**Kitchen and Multi - Purpose Room**

During the day it becomes an overflow study hall for Phy. Ed. classes.



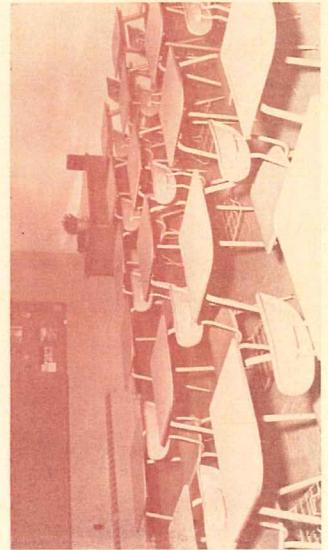
**Home Economics Classroom**

**Shop Room**

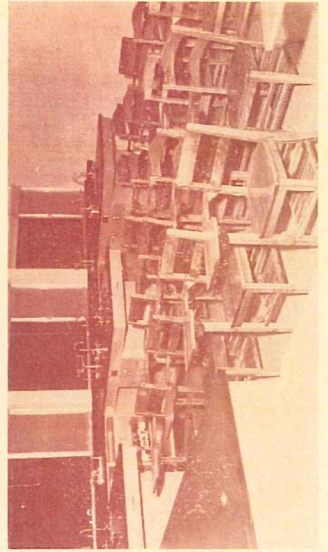
Our Shop receives heavy use through the Agriculture Classes, Industrial Arts, Young and Adult Farm and Adult Evening Classes. On some days 130 people may use the Shop facilities.



**Typical Classroom**

The typical classroom is 26'x28' in size. All desks are American Seating. Colors were selected throughout the building by the architect.

Storage cabinets will be added in the future.



**Chemistry and Physics Room**

Semi-Micro chemistry is being taught in the Laboratory. This offers many advantages to the student.

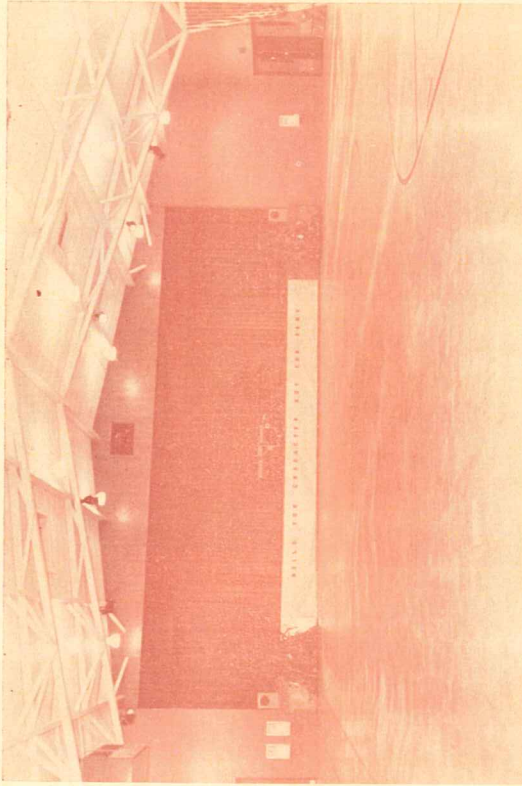

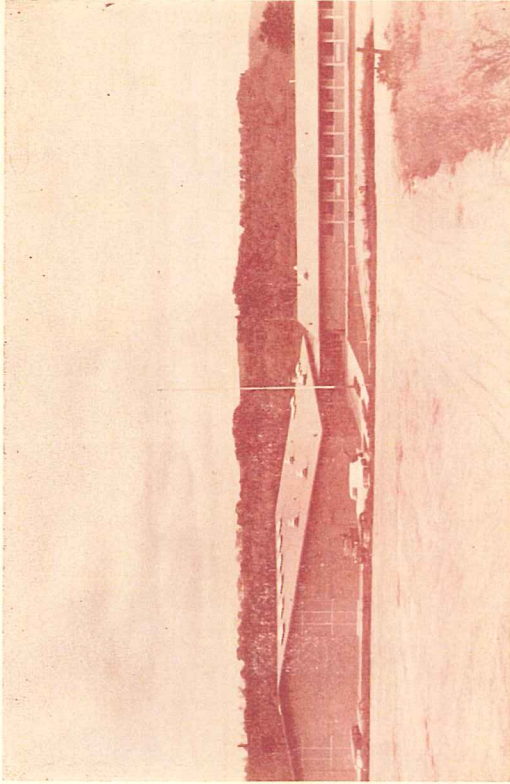
**HISTORY OF THE BUILDING PROJECT**

The completion of the new Wonevoo - Center High School is the culmination of work involving many people in the surrounding communities for several years. It marks a milestone in the forward march of educational progress in this area. The erection of the building has been accomplished through the efforts of all the citizens to meet the educational needs of the entire community.

**CHRONOLOGY OF EVENTS**

- FEBRUARY 17, 1958—Jt. Dist. No. 3, Union Center merged with Jt. No. 1, Wonevoo by order of the Juneau and Sauk County School Committee.
- APRIL 10, 1958—Building Committee appointed.
- JULY 18, 1958—Durrant and Bergquist chosen as architects.
- FEBRUARY 9, 1959—Special School Meeting. Proposal to integrate with Elroy defeated.
- MARCH 31, 1959—Electors designate the McKenzie - Manglos property as the site for the Wonevoo - Center School.
- APRIL 3, 1959—School Bond Issue passed by electors of the district.
- JUNE 1, 1959—Special School Meeting. Board membership increased from five to seven members.
- SEPTEMBER 8, 1959—Sale of school bonds totaling \$300,000.00.
- OCTOBER 8, 1959—Bids opened and contracts awarded for general construction, electrical, plumbing and heating, and ventilating work.
- OCTOBER 23, 1959—Ground Breaking Ceremony.
- OCTOBER 23, 1959—Construction begins.
- SEPTEMBER 13, 1960—Classes open in new building.
- NOVEMBER 9, 1960—Formal dedication of the new building followed by Open House.

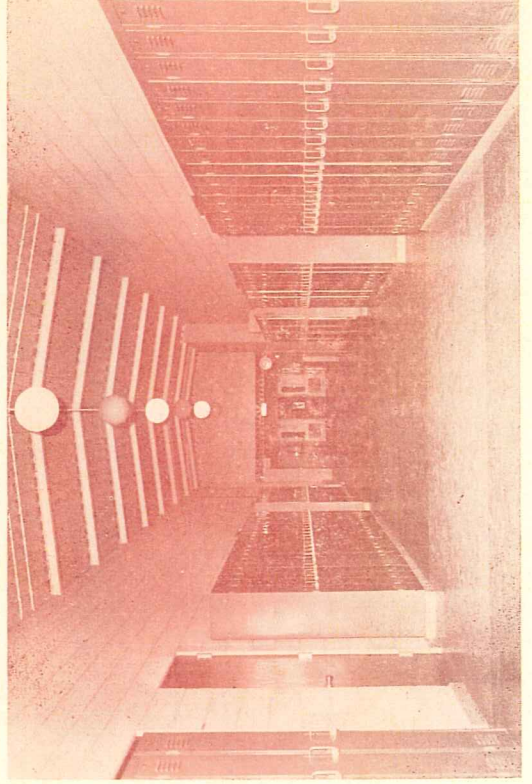
